



## St Ignatius Catholic Primary School Pupil Premium Grant Statement 2016-17

### What is the Pupil Premium Grant?

The aim of the Pupil Premium Grant is to raise achievement among disadvantaged pupils. The Pupil Premium is allocated to children from:

- Low-income families who are currently known to be eligible for Free School Meals (plus pupils who have been eligible for FSM at any point in the last six years (known as the Ever6 FSM measure)
- pupils who are looked after or in care, or have been adopted from care
- pupils whose parents are in the armed services.

It is for schools to decide how the Pupil Premium Grant is spent. However, measures will be included in the performance tables that will capture the achievement of those deprived pupils covered by the Pupil Premium Grant. The Government also requires schools to publish online details of how they have used the premium.

In order to meet the above requirements, the Academy Council of St Ignatius Catholic Primary School ensures that Pupil Premium spending is personalised according to the need of each pupil. Leaders undertake a thorough review of the learning of every child, identifying potential barriers. An individual programme is then put in place, which may respond to academic, social, health or emotional needs.

The school staff are committed to 'Narrowing the Gap' between vulnerable pupils and the Pupil Premium Grant will form a vital part of that process.

### At St. Ignatius' Catholic Primary School:

- We have high aspirations and ambitions for our children and we believe that no child should be left behind.
- We will ensure that teaching and learning opportunities meet the needs of all the pupils.
- We will ensure that appropriate provision is made for pupils who belong to vulnerable groups; this includes ensuring that the needs of socially disadvantaged pupils are assessed and addressed.
- In making provision for socially disadvantaged pupils, we recognise that not all pupils who receive Free School Meals will be socially disadvantaged. We also recognise that not all pupils who are socially disadvantaged are registered or qualify for Free School Meals.
- Pupil Premium funding is allocated following a needs analysis which identifies priority groups or individuals. Limited funding and resources means that not all pupils receiving Free School Meals will be supported through Pupil Premium interventions at any one time.

### Success Criteria for the Pupil Premium:

- Early intervention and support for socially disadvantaged children.
- Socially disadvantaged pupils meeting their individual targets.
- Effective parental pupil school support.
- Having an effective system for identifying, assessing and monitoring pupils.
- Having a whole-school approach.
- Creating a positive school atmosphere in which pupils' differences are recognised and valued as full members of the school community.
- Developing confident and independent learners.
- Phase Leaders will continue to improve the quality of teaching, ensuring greater consistency in practice and expectations, thus reducing any in-school variance.
- Increased sport provision in school.
- Increased uptake of out-of-school activities.
- Development of the effectiveness of Middle Leaders.

## **Use of Pupil Premium:**

### **Targeted support may include:**

- Reading Intervention
- Individual Reading
- Individual Numeracy or Literacy sessions
- Extra Staff to support individuals and groups
- Emotional support through Catholic Care worker
- 1-1 tuition
- Parental Courses

### **Extended school support may include:**

- Supplying uniform and resources
- Attendance at after school clubs
- Attendance at local clubs

### **Enrichment of the curriculum may include:**

- Purchase of resources
- Workshops
- Visiting authors
- Subsidised visits and events
- Music Services
- Team building

## **Use of Pupil Premium 2015/16** (see table at the end of report)

The level of funding in 2015/16 was:

£300 for pupils in receipt of Early Year PP funding grant

£1300 for each pupils entitled to Pupil Premium funding grant

A total of £28,945 was received in the financial year 2015/16

### **The Pupil Premium Grant for 2015/16 was targeted to:**

- Create additional individual or small group tuition programmes for children who needed to boost their learning to reach their potential in Reading, writing or maths
- Support part of the cost of employing a Catholic Care worker to support children's emotional needs
- Teaching Assistant support in each class to raise attainment and accelerate pupils' progress.
- Subsidies for school visits for PP pupils to enhance and enrich the curriculum.
- Small group phonics/spelling support at all levels
- Purchase of additional resources to support phonics development in EY and KS1
- Purchase additional resources to develop EY pupil's emotional and social skills
- Support time for SENCO.

### **The impact of the PPG for 2015/16**

Whilst some of the impact of this funding can be extrinsically measured in terms of attainment and rates of progress much of it is intrinsic. It is about enabling all children to feel confident, to have good self-worth, to strengthen emotional and social well-being.

Ultimately, it is to give parity of opportunity, regardless of a child's background. Any individual needs of Pupil Premium children were addressed ensuring that the children attended regularly and were happy when in school.

### Progress & National Curriculum Expectations:

The school's evaluation of its own performance is rigorous; tracking of progress over time for each pupil is thorough, and so we can quickly identify gaps and develop sensible strategies and interventions to promote improvement.

For a number of reasons, not all children achieve the year group national expectations but during their time at the school they may have made good or outstanding progress from their individual starting point.

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### Use of Pupil Premium 2016/17

The grant in 2016/17 of approximately £27,860 will enable school to support socially disadvantaged children in additional ways to help them reach their full potential. The priorities for the academic year 2016/17 will be focused on 'narrowing the gap' for those pupils not on track to achieve end of year expectations in Reading, writing and mathematics and ensuring that all children (including Pupil Premium children) make at least good progress from their individual starting points. The grant is to be used to provide, for example:

- Additional one to one tuition to support learning in Reading, writing and maths.
- Additional group tuition to support learning.
- Additional Reading and numeracy resources to support learning.
- Aspiration raising activities that will benefit the child or young person's learning and development.
- Family Learning opportunities.
- Extra learning resources (including staff)
- Any other support that will benefit the individual child either educationally or emotionally.
- Teaching Assistant support in each class to raise attainment and accelerate pupils' progress.
- Subsidies for school visits for Pupil Premium pupils to enhance and enrich the curriculum.
- Small group phonics support at all levels.
- Half day per week support time for SENCO.
- Any other support that will benefit the individual child either educationally or emotionally.
